

You've moved into Welton. Welcome to our friendly village.



Welcome to Welton, a village and civil parish in Northamptonshire. The village is 2.6 miles north of Daventry. It is 13 miles west-north west of Northampton, 9 miles south east of Rugby and 78 miles north-west of London.

The village is 1 mile along the A361 that runs between Daventry and Crick where the M1 junction 18 gives access to the national motorway network north and south.

The village and parish of Welton had a population of 608 in the 2011 census. For the purposes of local government, the village falls within the district of Daventry.

Village History

The name *Welton* derives from the Old English meaning *Wel* or spring and *Ton* being the Saxon word for a village. Archaeological evidence has shown that the six springs in the parish prompted a Roman encampment.

Welton has an entry in the Domesday Book of 1085 where its population, land ownership and productive resources were extensively detailed. In the survey Welton is recorded by the names of *Waletone*, *Weletone* and *Welintone*. The tenants post-conquest were Wulfrner from the Count of Mortain, Osbern from Hugh de Grandmesnil and Leofric from the Countess Judith. The survey also lists that there was a mill.

The parish church has a prominent position in the centre of the village. The building is constructed from Northamptonshire iron stone. At the western end there is a square tower with corner buttresses. The present building is probably 14th century, built on the site of an earlier church.

Welton Place was a large country house which once stood in the village but was demolished in 1972. It was built by Joseph Clarke in 1758. The Clarke family had been associated with the parish of Welton since around 1596. Joseph Clarke had been High Sheriff of Northamptonshire.



Welton Place was converted to flats but ultimately demolished in 1972. The deeds, family and estate papers including household accounts are available at the National Archives covering the Clarke family from 1366 to 1896. Clarke's Way now stands on the site of the house.

Village Hall



Welton Village Hall is owned by the villagers with the day to day running in the hands of the Village Hall Committee.

Welton Church of England Academy



The first school in the village was established in 1820 and situated near to the present school building. The school moved to its present site in Well Lane in 1910 and it was extended in 1976, 1995 and 2004.

The school's catchment area consists of Welton and Ashby St Ledger but in addition, a number of pupils come from Daventry other surrounding villages. The school is very popular and has been oversubscribed for several years.

The present school consists of five classrooms, a hall, and a library. There are 2 designated activity areas, staff room, administration office and headteacher's study. Outside the school there is a landscaped playground and use of the adjoining recreation field for sports activities.

Welton Good Neighbour Scheme

Imagine you're home alone with a young child. You've just dropped your last pint of milk on the floor. Planning to pop to the shop, you find your car battery has died. Or you're a little unsteady on your feet and a light bulb blows. You're tempted to use the step ladder but worried that you might fall. Perhaps you have a friendly neighbour you could call on to give you a hand? Perhaps not.

Well, as a Welton resident you're in luck because help is just a phone call away. The Welton Good Neighbour Scheme (WGNS) is part of a county wide initiative that capitalises on the innate desire of many people to lend a hand if

they can. Manned by a team of volunteers, anyone in our village, young or old, can call a hotline and request help.

The call taker then consults the volunteer list to see who has the best skills to help. The range of situations they can help with can be any kind of physical, technical, or practical task – the team are open to all types of request and will always do their best to assist.



It's not just about sorting those annoying problems either. Many of the volunteers can offer friendship visits to any villager who feels isolated. And with a monthly coffee afternoon and regular pub lunch, it's a great way to bring the village together and help people to have a social life right on their doorstep. If you struggle with mobility to get to these events, the WGNS can arrange to transport you to the door.
